# Thoughts from Ian...



### February 2024

"It's almost time to stop, so, choose one more thing to do," sang Daniel Tiger. In the other room, Alissa and I danced along with the songs from Daniel Tiger's Neighborhood as we made supper in the kitchen. Daniel, a cartoon tiger from a show on PBS kids based on Mr. Roger's Neighborhood, has been a favorite for our children. He sings catchy songs like Thank You, Goodnight Daniel, and Keep Trying. And, best of all, each song portrays an important message.



The song above, It's Almost Time to Stop, is often sung in our house as we help Samuel, Henry, and Brynn transition from one activity to another. It can be difficult for them to be done with an activity and start something else—to stop playing and eat dinner, to stop reading and start bedtime, or to stop a game and start schoolwork. Slowing down, signaling a change, and getting ready for something different has been a game changer in parenting our kids.

To be honest, I sometimes need help to transition as well. In the morning, I am grateful for a slow transition waking up. A cup of coffee, dim lights, and a quiet breakfast help my day start right. When my wife needs to talk, I need help transitioning to conversation. I find it greatly beneficial if we wait for the kids to go down, I put away distractions, and I am prepared to communicate. Transitions are a blessing. Have you found this to be true?

Lent is a season of transition. Starting on February 14<sup>th</sup>, the season of Lent will last 40 days (not including Sundays) to the Saturday before Easter. Many Christians will be preparing for the celebration of Easter through reflection, prayer, fasting, or acts of charity in light of Jesus' work on our behalf on the cross. It is a season to transition from whatever we may be in the habit of doing to refocus on what Jesus has done for us.

On Wednesdays during Lent, we will be hosting free Lenten Lunches for the community. From noon to 1:00pm, churches will take turns bringing food for everyone and local pastors will take turns giving a devotional message. On Wednesday evenings at 5:30pm, we will be having a free meal together followed by a devotional time. Along with Sunday school at 9:00am and our service at 10:15am every Sunday, we hope you will be able to join us this Lenten season.

Transitions are important. How much more should we be taking advantage of transitioning into the celebration of Easter. After all, this is the core of our faith. As we are told in 1 Corinthians 15, if Christ has not been raised, our faith is futile; we are still in our sins. But Jesus did rise from the dead and triumphed over the grave! Let's prepare together.


