## Thoughts from Ian...

#### May 2023 Newsletter

Have you ever had to say "goodbye" to a friend? Maybe your parents were moving and you needed to change schools. Maybe you were graduating from high school and you were moving to a different part of the country. Maybe your friend was passing away and you had a chance to speak one last time. It is true that Christians never need to say "goodbye" because we will see one another in the new heavens and new earth, but even these temporary "goodbyes" can be difficult.

I had to say "goodbye" to a friend this week. Adam Papin, the editor of the Paulding Progress, is moving away. Adam and I have been able to get to know each other through Kiwanis. Most Thursdays, we ate lunch together and learned what was happening in the community. I often saw him around town or at sports games. I remember taking my sons to a Paulding high school wrestling match and my kids were so excited to see Adam there covering the matches. Adam would come over and play board games with Brent, Alissa, and I on Friday nights. He may not have always liked the games, but he was willing to learn. He would draw pictures of animals for my kids, which they still cherish. He cared about the community, and he worked hard to see the paper improve. He loved the village, and I can say that with confidence because he sought its good. I think it pleased God.



In Jeremiah 29, God's people were in exile. Nebuchadnezzar had taken many Jews into exile in Babylon from Jerusalem. The question was, how did God command them to live? Does he command his people to undermine the city, stir up trouble, or try to flee? No. God commanded them to build houses, plant gardens, settle in, and seek the welfare of the city! God says, "Wherever I have put you, seek the good of that community."

In God's time, God promises that he will fulfill his promises to his exiled people and bring them out of Babylon. Jeremiah 29:11 is often misquoted to directly apply to Christians. But this promise is only a part of God's promise fully seen in verses 10-14, that he will bring exiled Jews back from exile. Yet, the character of God is the same. God desires that we would be a blessing to the communities where he places us, and we should remember that he is faithful.

In the New Testament we see a similar command. Paul instructs us, "make it your ambition to lead a quiet life: You should mind your own business and work with your hands, just as we told you, so that your daily life may win the respect of outsiders and so that you will not be dependent on anybody." 1 Thessalonians 4:11-12.

I am proud that many people in our church have the same ambition. I love that we have a church that seeks to be a blessing to our community. Many of you live quiet lives, minding your own business, working with your hands, earning respect by your hard work. Many of you serve and volunteer in our community to make it a better place. Many of you give generously to improve our community. You are a blessing to Paulding County, and I love you for it and it pleases God.

#### **New Business**


-Session approved a few calendar items involving permission to use the Fellowship Hall:






